n 2022-2023, we began a 7-term modular schedule. The year consists of 7 terms of 5 weeks each; during each term, students take 3-4 classes. Most courses are 3 credits ("mods"), comparable to a year-long course. Over the 7 terms, students take the equivalent of 6-8 year-long classes.

The transcript will list all classes the student will take during the year and the number of credits ("mods") in each. Progress grades will be issued in mid-November, late December, and mid-February. All grades are cumulative, as some courses span two years. Final cumulative grades will be reported in mid-June.

George School offers college-prep, advanced, intensive, Advanced Placement (AP), and International Baccalaureate (IB) courses. George School does not weight grades or compute class rank.

Due to the 7-term schedule and individual differences in each student's schedule, some students may not receive a grade in all classes before Mid-Year Reports are due to colleges. Please contact the College Counseling Office with any questions.

#### **GRADING SCALE**

A – F (including + and -). D- is the lowest passing grade.

#### **GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS**

Students are expected to earn 6 credits in each of the seven academic departments (English, History, Language, Math, Science, Arts, Religions) over the course of 9th and 10th grades. Then, students must either:

- Fulfill the requirements of the IB Diploma Program, **or**
- Design their own 11th- and 12th-grade college preparatory program during which they earn at least 36 credits (not including sports and physical education), including at least 3 credits in Arts and at least 3 credits in Religions.

#### All students must also:

- Include among their courses 3 credits in US History and 2 credits in Biology (typically done in 10th grade)
- Fulfill the physical education/team activity requirements
- Fulfill the co-op/service learning requirement of 30 hours

#### **DISCIPLINE REPORTING POLICY**

George School requires its students to respond truthfully when college applications ask about disciplinary violations. Counselors will likewise respond truthfully about student disciplinary violations when asked.

George School offers **19 AP subjects.** The class of 2024 earned scores of 3 or higher on 81% of AP exams.

George School offers 35 IB subjects. In 2023, 81% of the graduating class took at least one IB exam.

There are 32 IB Diploma candidates in the Class of 2024. George School has held a pass rate in the mid-90s for the last ten years.

### **SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY**

Founded in 1893, George School is a Quaker, college preparatory, all-gender boarding and day school for students in grades 9 through 12. George School is accredited by the Pennsylvania Association of Independent Schools and Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. The International Baccalaureate program is accredited by The International Baccalaureate. George School is one of the few boarding schools in the United States offering the IB Diploma.

George School is grounded in a Quaker approach to education that inspires students to be who they are—and trust who they can become. Foundational elements of Quakerism are woven into daily life. Students call teachers by their first name, contribute to the school community through the co-op program, and attend meeting for worship each week.

#### **MEETING FOR WORSHIP**

Quaker meeting for worship is unprogrammed; the community sits in

shared silence until someone feels called to speak. Day students attend meeting for worship in our Meetinghouse, a Quaker house of worship, once per week; boarding students attend twice.

#### **CO-OP PROGRAM**

Since the 1940s students have participated in co-op, a contribution to the school community. All students are assigned a co-op every year with the expectation that they complete 45 minutes—1 hour of co-op duties each week. All students begin their

co-op experience at George School with Shift, helping our dining services staff in the Dining Hall. Nearly every department on campus welcomes co-op assignments. Example co-ops include taking photos for the Communications Office, assisting our Children's Center, or helping out in our science labs.

#### THE LARAMORE AWARD

This award annually recognizes two George School students who are "quiet givers." Recipients have assisted others on a one-to-one basis, quietly demonstrating leadership through acts of kindness, generosity of spirit, and service to our community.

#### **HEAD OF SCHOOL'S LIST**

At the end of the academic year, students are nominated to the Head of School's List for their diligence, constructive attitude, thoroughness, dependability, punctuality, and overall commitment to excellence. To be named to the list, students must earn eighteen or more individual nominations from faculty and staff. At least fourteen of the nominations must be from the arts, English, history, language, mathematics, religions, or science. The other nominations may come from any of the above or from other areas such as co-op, physical education, or a team activity.

#### **HONOR ROLL**

Students are named to the Honor Roll at the end of the academic year when their cumulative grades in all courses as of the end of the year are a B or higher in each subject area that earns an A, B, C, D, or F rating, or average a B+ (3.33 on a 4.0 GPA scale) with no grade lower than a C.
